Andover Wins 1-0 Over Belmont

The local High School Team scored their lone run, which proved to be all they needed, in the 4th inning. Ike Conner, lanky sophomore 1st baseman, bunted safely and stole 2nd. When Sophomore Mike Baker attempted another bunt and missed, the visiting 3rd baseman came charging in leaving the base unguarded so Ike promptly scampered into 3rd safely. On the next pitch, Mike responded with a clean single which scored the winning run of the game.

Dave Thorp, the slender sophomore pitcher who received credit for the win, pitched until the 6th inning when he was relieved after the first enemy batsman reached him for a single, with the runner advancing to 2nd, in scoring position after a wild pitch and no outs recorded.

Jim Cannon, a Junior, who has 3 wins to his credit, came in but hit the first batter placing runners on 1st and 2nd but was able to strike out the next batter. His first pitch to the next batter was wild which moved the runners to 2nd and 3rd! The eager hitter bunted the ball on a squeeze play but Jim scooped up the ball, tossed it to catcher Ed Smith who promptly tagged the runner trying to score. The Belmont runner who had advanced to 3rd on the play, tried to steal home when catcher Ed Smith threw the ball back to pitcher Cannon. Jim being on the alert quickly threw back to Ed who successfully tagged the sliding runner out to end the inning.

In the 7th inning the Belmont batters didn't have a chance as Jim mowed them down 1-2-3 with strike-outs. Thorp allowed 4 hits, no runs and struck out 4; Cannon didn't permit a hit, struck out 4, hit 1 and no runs scored.
