Industry Representatives Meet With Civil Defense Director

Representatives of major industries, utilities and business met with the County Civil Defense Director Wednesday afternoon, May 22nd, to discuss the final emergency operating procedures for building and employee protection to be issued by Civil Defense authority. This was the culmination of a series of meetings wherein problems were developed and solutions discussed.

County Director Robert L. Coulter stated that the final plan would be issued shortly and made a part of the entire county Civil Defense emergency operating plan. The plan will include the detailing of traffic control points, the movement of employees from exposed areas to their nearest shelter and the establishing of radiological monitoring locations.

The plan encompasses communications between major installations and the county Emergency Operating Center and the procedures for the securing of emergency fuel or equipment to continue the operation of machinery and heating units needed for the protection of vital properties.

Mr. Coulter stated that the Supervisors Civil Defense Committee and himself were more than pleased with the excellent cooperation which had been rendered by those participating in the meetings and that on their behalf he made the statement "This type of cooperation is indicative of the industrial and commercial life of the county and the desire of its managements to look to the protection of their employees and the people of the county."

WIDESPREAD USE of antibiotics to treat simple infections such as the common cold is producing resistance to the drugs rather than relief from the ailments, according to a report given by D. J. H. Greenwood at the University of Texas. "Promiscuous" use of antibiotics, he says, has resulted in more and more persons carrying streptococci and staphylococci that are resistant to penicillin and similar drugs. Excessive protective therapy of this type, he adds, upsets the equilibrium of the human body and actually promotes growth of antibiotic-resistant germs.

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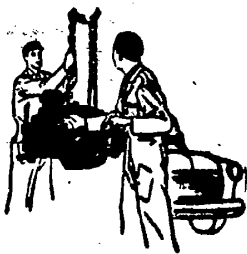
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
