

Col. A. E. Fisher Speaker At Memorial Services

Lt. Colonel Almond E. Fisher, winner of the Congressional Medal of Honor in World War II, was the guest speaker at the Memorial Services held at the Andover Central School May 29th at 3:00 p. m.

The services were opened by Robert Vickers giving the "Gettysburg Address", followed by Judy Woodruft reciting "In Flanders Fields". The ACS band, directed by Gerald McClure, played several rousing martial airs that were very suitable for the occasion.

Principal James H. Kessler welcomed the guests and introduced Allegany County American Legion Commander Craig Snyder who then spoke on the Americanism then spoke on the Americanism program of the American Legion.

Craig then introduced Col Fish-Craig then introduced Col Fisher of Tonawanda, N. Y., Chief of the Contact Division Veterans Administration in Buffalo. N. Y. Col Fisher has been the Inspector General for the 27th Armored Division of the N. Y. Army National Guard for several years and is Americanism Chairman for the 8th District of the American Legion.

The entire school attendance and teachers, as well as several members of the American Legion Lynch-Burgett Post and Auxiliary furnished an appreciative audience, but due to the limited seating capacity the general public was not able to be invited.

This being the case we are presenting Col Fisher's inspiring message so that all our readers will be able to enjoy it:

We are gathered here in the sacred, spiritual presence of our war dead on this Memorial Day.

Just as we meet here reverently, humbly, devotedly, so, in this same spirit, throughout the nation today men and women are paying homage to our nation's war dead.

Earth and life are wonderful, to be alive in this great nation is

Do you not think that our gallant war dead would like to hear from us some response of appreciation for all this?

They lived and died courageously with faith and affirmation so that our life might be even more wonderful.

We are paying honor to a unique assortment of men. We are here today to honor a brotherhood united in its very diversity.

We are here to honor the kicarnation of the motto "E Pluribus Unum"—"From Many, One."

Yes, the men we honor today were as varied as they were many, and yet, miraculously they were

and yet, miraculously they were

one.

They were as different as the altars at which they prayed; they were Catholic, Protestant, and

Jewish.
Yes, they were different in color too. They were white, black, yel-

low, red.

They were as different as the lands they left to reach our gold-

They were as different as men

an be—one from another.

But they were alike in that they were created in God's image and they were all alike because they died for us. THEY ARE OUR HERITAGE.

People often say, "America is great because America is rich. Because she has oil, iron, steelmills, rich farmlands, an unprecedented standard of living.

America is really great because of the sacrifices these martyred dead have made on the fields of war, on the altars of battle.

We must be willing to do as much in our daily lives to bury intolerance, to banish pride, to erase ignorance, to destroy hate.
We must bury, once and for all, these emotions so that an era of peace and prosperity and happiness can grow.

These emotions are the very seeds from which communism springs.

Communism has a plan to take

over our country.
