Robert Smith, Professor of Forensics and Speech at Colgate University and a member of the Class of 1948, titled his address "Open Sesame". He recalled the fable of Alababa and the magic words that enabled him to live happily ever after. Mr. Smith pointed out that material goods are not cure-alls for human problems. The individual holds the treasures of human existence. We as individuals, he emphasized, are the real wealth and we must give attention to this now. We must invest heavily in man and unlock the potential—in Andover as elsewhere. Citing the recent feat in space, he said that if it were not for man, most advances would not be possible. Mr. Smith also quoted John Ruskins' "Sesame" and T. S. Eliots' "The Hollow Man" to enforce his ideas of man and his self-contained wealth. In closing he presented the four objectives of Hindu philosophy regarding exist-

ence and explained how they can be guideposts for the individual today. They are: first, seek and satisfy the need for pleasure but don't stop there; second, seek success by establishing and achieving your own goals; third, duty to others after the first two steps are met and fourth, find meaning for your individual being.

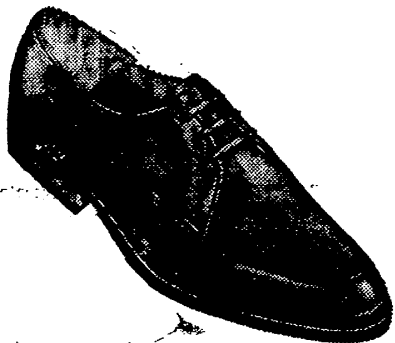
