The individual holds the treasures of human existence. We as individuals, he emphasized, are the real wealth and we must give attention to this now. We must invest heavily in man and unlock the potential—in Andover as elsewhere. Citing the recent feat in space, he said that if it were not for man, most advances would not be possible. Mr. Smith also quoted John Ruskins' "Sesame" and T. S. Eliots' "The Hollow Man" to enforce his ideas of man and his self-contained wealth.
