New Loan Program On Water Supplies

Water supplies to meet future community needs throughout New York can now be cost-shared with the Federal Government. The new financial arrangement is a feature added to small watershed projects, according to Irving. B. Stafford, State Conservations for the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, at Syracuse.

Total Ambulance Calls

Towns and cities planning to build flood prevention dams can thus increase their capacity to take care of stepped-up water demands by industry and municipalities. Long range increases in population and economic growth are expected to place a heavy drain on present reservoirs. Up to 30 percent Federal financing through agencies of the U.S. Dept., of Agriculture has been made available to store water for future emergencies.

tuture emergencies.

The loans are est-marked for local sponsors receiving technical assistance under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention

Act. The recent Congressional amendment provides that repayment of a water supply loan begins when the reservoir goes into future use, or within 10 years after completion of a structure.

According to State Conservationist Stafford, provision for water resources is one of many current amendments to the national small watershed, program enacted as Public Law 566. Other

technical and financial planning assistance for watershed projects includes development to public reation areas, fish and wildlife habitat, and water for agricultural uses.
