An alumnus of Alfred University, Dr. Crawford first was elected to the Board of Trustes in 1935.—He is Vice Chancellor, emeritus, of Syracuse University where he served on the faculty for 43 years.

Dr. Crawford, the new Chairman of the Board, was Deam of Syracuse's College of Liberal Arts from 1938 to 1950 and served as acting dean of nearly all of the University's schools and colleges.

He became the University's second highest administrative officer in 1942 and held that position until his retirement in 1959. He taught in the Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship and Public Affairs Citizenship and Public Affairs from 1924 to 1958 and was an ad-visor or member of three major

mortgage loans, unemployment and labor. He was Chairman of the Syrathe was chairman of the Syracuse Regional Hospital authority that supervised the spending of \$5,500,000 in state and federal aid funds for hospital improvement in the Central New York Area from 1945-56

He is a trustee of the New York State Power Authority, a member of the Board of Directors of the Citizens National Bank, Wellsville, and an educational consultant for the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.
