## Andover Post Office Gets Zip Code Number 14806

Everyone in Andover, N. Y., will use this ZIP Code on all their correspondence to speed mail deliveries and reduce the chance of mis-sent mail.

ZIP Code, the Post Office Department's revolutionary new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery, goes into effect nationally on July 1.

It is important that all citizens of Andover, N. Y., learn this city's ZIP Code and use it in their return address on all correspondence. In answering mail, ZIP Codes taken from return addresses on incoming mail should be used.

"The ZIP Code is literally the last word in mail addressing. It should follow the city and state addresses.

He cited this example of the proper use of ZIP Code:

The new ZIP Code plan, for the first time will permit the Post Office Department to short-cut repeated address reading.

The address on mail must often be read as many as eight or ten times by postal employees, to get it to the proper destination. Each handling slows the process of mail dispatch and adds to the opportunity for human error.

With ZIP Code, a clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery.
