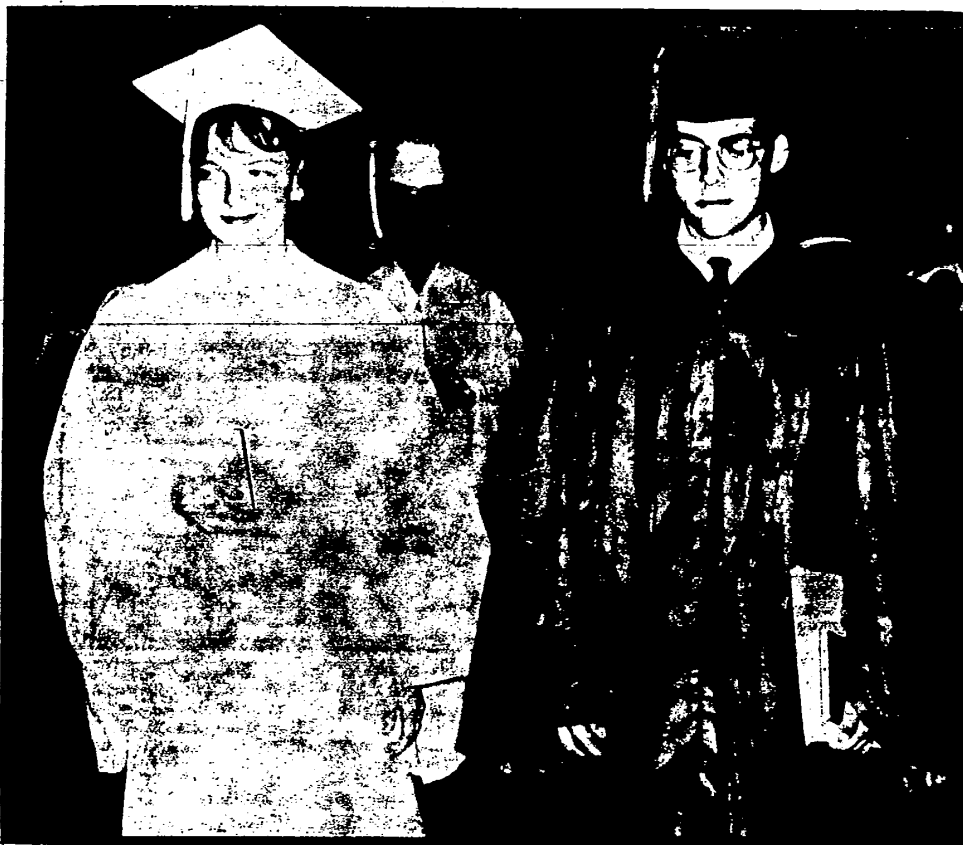

What is so rare as a day in June?—Naturally, several of them in a row like we have been enjoying this week. In fact it was so hot yesterday that it drove the local News Editor into snorts to the amusement of some of the local wags.

It seems that when the pretty girls and women wear them its a case of "the shorter the better" but when men wear them there is a different point(s) of interest.

With the outbreak of burglaries in Canisteo and other nearby communities and the daring daylight theft at the local Market Basket Store it would probably be a good idea for people around here to take a few extra precautions about locking up their homes in the evening and not going away and leave them wide open.

Another point of interest also is that people going on vacations would be wise to have someone in the neighborhood keep a weather eye peeled on their home as there have been cases where a truck has pulled up to an unattended home, loaded many valuable household goods on and then calmly driven away.

This kind of "shook us up a little" so we hurried back to see if things were all set up only to find that any fears or worries were groundless.

Both groups were already at the cemetery with everything in readiness so that all was needed was a final word or two of co-ordination when the funeral procession arrived.

This kind of wonderful co-operation and helpfulness is really heart warming when you stop and reflect that these people left their own daily tasks or work in order to fulfill a self imposed obligation.
