In answering mail use the Zip Code number on the return address of incoming mail, following the name, town, state and Zip Code number. The Post Office Department in Washington, D. C., will start the new system of improved mail dispatch and delivery nationally July 1, 1963. With Zip Code the clerk needs only to glance at the number to know what national area, state and post office the letter is destined. Notice Of Public Hearing On Fire Protection Contract

A public hearing will be held at the Village Office on Main Street, Andover, New York, on Tuesday, July 9th, 1963, at 8:00 P. M., on the proposed fire protection contract between the Town of Andover and the Village of Andover as parties of the first

part, and the Andover Fire Department Inc., party of the second part. Under said proposed contract, the Town of Andover and the Village of Andover are each to pay the Andover Fire Department Inc., the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00), a year for a term of five 45) years, being a total sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00), a year. Under the terms of the said contract, the said \$2,000.00 to be paid by the Town of Andover is to be paid directly to the Village of Andover, who in turn will then pay the \$4,000.00, directly to the Andover Fire Department Inc. Said contract to be for a five (5) year term, from January 1st, 1964, to December 31st, 1968.

The Andover Fire Department

The Andover Fire Department Inc., on its part agrees to supply fire protection, both to the Vil-

lage of Andover and the Town of Andover, and supply its own fire equipment which shall include a new fire truck and additional firenew fire truck and additional fire-fighting apparatus, and to main-tain a volunteer fire department, with sufficient members to supply fire protection to the Village and Town of Andover.

The proposed contract will rescind and revoze the prior contract between the parties hereto under which the Village and Town were to pay the sum of Three Thousand Dallars (\$3,000.00), a year.




