Red Cross News

Hopeful of helping to reduce the drowning toll of 6,500 a year, Edward Mergler, Chairman of the Allegany County Red Cross Chap-ter has issued "safety first" sug-gestions for those who will engage in water sports this summer.

A great majority of the annual drownings occur during recreational use of the water—swimming and boating—according to Elmo Barden, local water safety instructor.

"Most of these tragedies could have been averted if the victims and their companions had known and followed safe practices," Mr. Barden said.

"Both the drowning rate and the actual number of drownings have been reduced materially in the last 50 years," he continued. "But 6,500 a year are still too meny."

many."

His first caution on safety in the water was "Don't try to swim too far too soon." A swimmer going into the water for the first time this year doesn't have the endurance he had the end of last

summer.
Mr. Barden also warned of the great danger of games in which young people vie with each other in holding their breath for long periods under water. "Carbon periods under water. "Carbon Dioxide builds up in the blood

stream and brain when the breath is heid, and too much carbon di-oxide leads to unconsciousness. When unconscious, an underwater swimmer begins breathing auto-matically, which means inhaling water. Unless help is at hand to

get him very quickly to the surface he will drown."
