Greenwood Central School News

After two weeks of operation interest and activity in the Greenwood Youth Recreation Program is running high according to program workers.

A total of 56 individual lessons are being given each week in the music division along with a weekly band practice on Thursday evening.

The Band plans a public ice cream social and band concert on the lawn of the Masonic Hall at 8 p. m., July 26th.

As a participant in the parade at Savona July 12 the band won a second prize trophy. On July 20 the band traveled to Campbell to participate in a parade in that community. The band and music instruction is under the direction of Mrs. June Rollins.

The morning playground division headed by Miss Barbara Lamphier and Mrs. Elaine Allen, Monday through Friday, has had an average attendance of about 40 ranging in age from 4 - 12.

Activities are planned based on different age groupings. Craft-work to date has consisted of making hats, finger painting, making of wall hangers.

Highlight of this two weeks for the playground group was the Playground Fair, a new innovation this year. In preparation participants saved up bottle caps, milk bottle tops, and other small items to be used as money each of which was labeled according to value. Using this money the participants passed around various booths of the fair trying their luck at various skills such as guessing the number of rocks in a jar, throwing a ball through a hoop, and other miniature games in imitation of a grown-up fair. At each booth points were awarded to participants based upon their skill. At the close of the fair, points were totaled and those with the highest number of points for the morning were awarded prizes. Those not winning a prize by points were given a lollipop, their souvenir of the fair. Point winners were for age 4-8: 1st Ronnie Holt; 2nd Michael Holt; 3rd Connie Murray. The morning programs daily also include different games on the playground, the use of playground equipment, 20 minutes of film each day, surprise contests,

and story telling.

Fundamentals of baseball, playing of positions, and base running are presented daily along with batting, fielding, and catching practice. In addition to this practice games are played.

Except on rainy or very cold weather, swimming is being held daily.
