

Howard Burdick Selected To Tour Europe

Howard Burdick, local dairyman and farmer, was selected by the "Goodwill People-to-People Travel Program" as a representative of the New York Agricultural Delegation to tour Western and Eastern Europe.

This "People-to-People" good will tour is part of a plan to acquaint foreign people with the American Way of Life and Vice-versa.

Howard left Wednesday for Syracuse where he will attend a Committee meeting Wednesday afternoon and a regular Board meeting Thursday of the Metropolitan Co-operative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency.

Mr. Burdick; Robert Forsythe, manager of the Bargaining Agency; and Edward Cobb, a director of the Agency; will leave Syracuse Friday and fly to Idlewild for a briefing of the selected group of New York State agricultural leaders who will make the tour. Altogether there are 45 members in the group, 43 of which are from New York State and two from Pennsylvania.

The group will depart from New York Friday evening, arriving in Manchester, England around 12 hours later Saturday morning. Sunday they will drive to the agricultural area of Cheshire for a farm visit and lunch with local farmers and then proceed to the City of Coventry.

Monday they will drive to London visiting farming operations en route which will continue thru Tuesday.

Wednesday the group will fly to Brussels, Belgium where they will tour the Belgian Countryside making farm visits thru Thursday.

Friday the tour takes off for Moscow, Russia arriving there early in the evening. Saturday thru Wednesday will be spent on Soviet briefings and government conducted tour of Russian farming operations and other points of interest.

Thursday the Pilgrimage leaves for Warsaw, Poland where they will spend several days visiting farms around that area as well as have a chance to meet the Pole-on-the-street for an interview.

Sunday, the entire group proceeds to Budapest, Hungary where they will be entertained and visit farming operations until Tuesday when they will fly to Berlin, Germany.

Wednesday will be spent touring the Berlin area and will include a brief tour of East Berlin proceeding thru the well known check point Charlie.

Thursday, the agriculturists will fly from Berlin to Frankfurt, to Brussels and then on to New York arriving there early in the evening and will then travel home.

Altogether the tour will last 21 days into which will be crammed enough action to last the average man many moons.

Reward Offered For Vandalism Information

Additions totaling \$50 were reported to date to bring to \$125 the reward offered for information leading to solution of the police investigation of vandalism which last week closed the municipal swimming pool at Wellsville. Additions were \$15 from the Reporter, and \$25 offered jointly, as individuals, by Mayor Gardner and Village Trustees Waitkus, Field, Ludden and Thurner. Previously announced \$25 offers came from Station WLSV, Lester Chevrolet Garage and residents of Riverside Heights, Stannards. The pool was closed Thursday until Saturday after vandals left broken glass in the bottom of the pool and on the deck around it. Mr. Kishlar, pool director, said it was the first act of vandalism committed at the pool for three or four years.

Punch Card Renewals To Be Sent Out This Week

The mailing of punch card renewal applications to New York drivers whose operator licenses expire on September 30 will be begun by the State Department of Motor Vehicles this week, on August 5th. Commissioner William S. Hults announced.

The punch cards will go to approximately 1,750,000 drivers who are eligible to renew their licenses. They will not be mailed to those whose licenses are under suspension or have been revoked. Renewals for suspended licenses will be mailed at the end of the suspension period. Revoked licenses cannot be renewed.

Commissioner Hults said that about 175,000 of the applications will go out each day, with the mailing to be completed on August 16. Since the applications are not posted in alphabetical order, eligible drivers should not expect to receive their renewals until sometime during the week of August 19, he said. However, many will receive them before then.

This will be the third year punch cards have been mailed out and all operator licensees, except those who have had to obtain duplicates because of loss or mutilation of their original license, will have the punch card variety. Only a relatively few paper licenses still will be in existence at the conclusion of this renewal period.

Vandals Damage Local Laundramat

Sometime between 2 A. M. and 4 A. M., Wednesday morning, Vandals apparently entered the local laundramat causing considerable damage to the interior.

Everything was in order when the building was checked around 2 A. M., by Police Chief Middaugh but a little after 4 A. M., one of the residents in the building was awakened by the sound of running water.

Upon investigation it was found that a large stream of water was flowing thru the building, out the front and into the street.

Frank Cahill was summoned to shut off the water to the business and the gas and electricity was shut off from the outside since it would have been extremely dangerous to have entered the building with all of the electric machines still hooked up with several inches of water on the floor.

After the water had been cleaned up with the utilities shut off, it was discovered that several panels had been smashed, the coin part of several machines tampered with and an attempt had been made to force an inside door.

It was also found that a large nylon coupling connecting the 2 inch water line with the boiler had been broken, thus releasing a large flow of water.

Mr. Short, owner of the business was summoned to the scene and repairs were commenced with things back in operating condition in the afternoon.

Police are investigating several leads and anyone having any information that might be useful pertaining to any phase of the case is urged to contact Police Chief Fred Middaugh.
