780 Farms Approved For ACP

A total of 780 farms have been approved for financial aid in adopting soil and water conserving practices through the Agricultural Conservation Program during 1963 by the Allegany County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Cost-sharing funds of \$316,840 have been allocated for this work from the Federal Government.

"The signup this year means 51% of 1550 farms in the county will be assisted in this vital and continuing resource saving work", said Stephen Clarke chairman of the county committee.

"The ACP has reached 1241 separate farms during the past four years. Recently, we have encouraged operators of small farms to take part in the program, and as a result have helped to bring improved cultivation, woodlot and pasture management to about 46 percent of the agricultural land in Allegany County."

Benefits of the improved farm operation methods extend far beyond the individual farm fence and into the distant future, Mr. Clarke believes.

Most of the conservation improvements on land in Allegany County during the past quarter century have been encouraged by the cost-sharing provided through ACP, or as a result of improvements observed on farms utilizing the program.

Principal conservation work through ACP has included: Top-dressing, Established soil, SCS practices, Wildlife practices, Woodlot improvement and Tree Planting.

Practices eligible for ACP cost-sharing here are the result of development of a conservation program by the locally elected ASC committee cooperating with Soil Conservation Service, Extension Service, FHA, Pomona Grange, Farm Bureau, Dept. of Fish and Game, and the Forestry Dept.

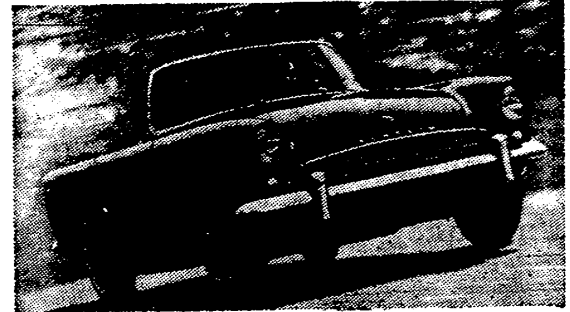

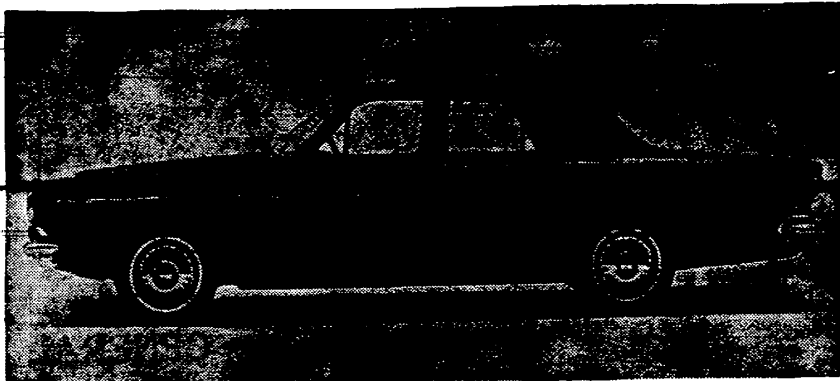
