Angelica Raceway News

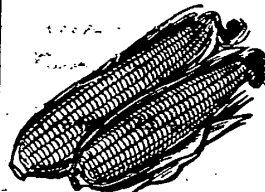
Pete Tingué continued his domination of the Modern Stock field at Angelica Raceway Friday night as he flew his famous fifty-seven Olds into the lead on the 10th lap and was never headed. The boys had a tough time getting going as it took the original start plus two restarts before the field got underway. The first start saw Billy Tingué fly into the inside of the third turn, sidelining his mount for the evening. On the first restart a three car tangle brought the field to a halt. The next time the green flag appeared Floyd Green and Jim Huffman opened the duel for the lead as the rest of the field battled for position. Tingué moved into the second spot on the 7th lap and the lead on the 10th lap. The battle was then on for second position with Don Klink, Floyd Green, DeVere Bliss and Eddie Anchor keeping things hot. Bliss rode up onto the crash barrier on the back stretch and then flew off into the pits where he crashed into Corky Hewitt's stalled car. The race was then red-flagged on the 20th lap as several of Corky's crew, car owner Floyd Barber, and mechanic Jack Beachel, were injured. On this restart Tingué held his lead while Floyd Greene outdueled Don Klink and Ed Anchor for the second spot while Klink nailed down the third position.

A near record field of cars reported for the amateur division with the fastest twenty eligible for the 30 lap feature. One car pulled into the infield before the start so 19 cars faced Whitey Gorsuch's green flag. Once again it was one start and two restarts before the field got under way. Leaders included: Bob Metcalf, Barney Johnson, Daryl Dennis, and Art Cartwright. Cartwright moved into the lead on the 17th lap and appeared headed for victory with Dennis in hot pursuit. On the 24th lap Cartwright booted a sure victory out the window as his right front wheel flew off and Dennis moved around him in the third turn to romp home to victory. Out of the 18 starters only 7 cars were able to finish. Once again the semis proved

to be the crowd pleasers with the first modern semi-final headlining a torrid duel between Don Wood and Maury Smith with the finish declared a dead heat.

The demolition derby awards went to Jim Wilcox for the last car left running while Ed Swartzberger captured the best show award.

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
