Experiment Station Schedules Open House For August 15, 1963

Tours of the various farms, machinery exhibits, and a keynote speaker are just three of many events that are scheduled for the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station's Open House, August 15, 1963.

Registration for the one-day event will start promptly at 9:30 a. m., and the last tour is scheduled to return to the main Station campus at 5:00 p. m. Luncheon facilities will be available on the premises at a nominal fee. All growers, seedsmen, processors, dairymen, and the general public are cordially invited to attend this event.

This marks the first time in about 5 years that the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station has opened its doors so that the general public can see the results of research. Several exhibits are scheduled to be erected, including one on the different types of pesticides, how to use these agricultural chemicals, what dangers there are, and what precautions to take in order to avoid these dangers.

There will be a continuous run of tours to the several Station farms in the Geneva vicinity. During these tours, visitors to the Open House will have an opportunity to see results of the Station's bean breeding trials, squash breeding trials, tomato and beet variety trials, seed vitality studies on beets and beans, and irrigation experiments among others. One particular demonstration that should prove valuable to growers of peaches, pears, and apples is that having to do with recognizing malnutrition deficiencies in these major fruit crops. During the latter part of July and August is the time when these deficiencies are most readily seen.

For those persons waiting to go on a tour, there will be a number of exhibits and demonstrations on the main campus of the Experiment Station. Included in this part of the program will be a rather thorough tour of the Department of Food Science and Technology. It is anticipated that the Department will include among its exhibits one on the preservation of apples by radiation.

At 1:30 p. m., there will be a brief welcoming address by D. W. Barton, Director of the Experiment Station, and this will be followed by a keynote address. It is hoped that the Dean of the College of Agriculture, Cornell University, will be present to make this address.

Greenwood Central School News

Workers of the Greenwood Recreation Program have announced that dates have been set for two of the annual events of the summer.

Booster Night will be August 5 commencing at 7:45 p. m. At that time demonstration baseball games will be put on for the benefit of visiting parents and friends by participants in the summer baseball teams. At 8:20 a program will commence in the gymnasium for further entertainment of the guests. Booster Night is for the purpose of showing parents some of the activities of the six week program and in addition acts as a method of raising funds to support the program.

Parents of participants in the summer program, regardless of what division, will be encouraged to furnish items of foodstuff that can be auctioned off that night.

On August 9 all those wishing will journey to Stony Brook State Park for the annual picnic. Buses will leave school at approximately 9:30 a. m. and will return late in the afternoon. The entire staff plus some volunteer parents will be in charge of supervising the group.

Meeting for its regular monthly meeting and its reorganization, the Board of Education of the Greenwood Central School elected Lloyd Chaffee, President and Richard York, Vice President. Following the election, official appointments were made.

Both the position of Treasurer and Collector were vacant due to previous resignations. Mrs. Florence Hardenburgh was given the appointment as Treasurer. She will maintain her office in her home.

Appointed as Collector was Clyde Witmer. Witmer will maintain an office in his home and in addition will maintain hours in the Village during the two months of actual collection. It is thought at this time that probably his headquarters would be at the school during these days.

Last fall, Wendell Sears, from the State Education Department's Bureau of Finance and Audit visited the school reviewing business procedures. At that time he recommended that the tax roll furnished to the school district should be copied by a different person than the collector. To implement this arrangement, Mrs. Jacqueline Murphy was nominated to this position.

Other appointments, the appointees having previously served the district in that capacity were: Clerk for the District, Mrs. Marjorie Matthews; School Physician, Dr. Samuel Meyers; Attendance Officer, Milo Downey; Official Bank, Greenwood Office of the First State Bank of Canisteo; Purchasing Agent, Wesley Tennant; Extra-Classroom Fund Treasurer, Mrs. Doris Cheesman; Extra Classroom Fund Auditor, Wesley Tennant; Census, Mrs. Kathleen O'Hagan.

Bids of suppliers of milk, ice cream, and bakery products for the cafeteria were opened. Awards were made to low bidders as follows: Milk—Scott's Dairy; Bakery Products, Stroehmann's Bakers; Ice Cream—Rich's Ice Cream Co.

A report from the School nurse, Charity McCormick, was reviewed indicating accidents for the past year and claims paid by insurance carriers. The Board voted to continue to offer to parents on an optional basis, the School Child Accident policy which has been available for many years. In addition, a small limited coverage was voted for each pupil. Details will be explained to parents in September prior to the opening date of the policy which is in Oct.

Carol Bassett was appointed to the Agricultural Advisory Board for a period of 5 years. One member of the Board of Education is customarily included on the five-man advisory Board. Other members of the Advisory Board are: Francis Meehan, George Williamson, Charles Smith and James McCaffery.

The resignation of Mrs. Grace Phite, teacher of sixth grade was accepted. Miss Ellen McNeill, a graduate of Mansfield State Teachers' College of Mansfield, Pa., has been engaged to fill the vacated position.

A report was received from Robert Hoagland, Agriculture teacher, reviewing the annual meeting of Agricultural Teachers, held this year at Harpur College. Hoagland's report also revealed plans for the summer with members of the FFA. Plans are being made to go to the Woodsmen's Carnival at Cherry Spring State Park in Pennsylvania; to attend the five-county Farm Equipment Demonstration at Prattsburg sponsored by the Extension Service;

to attend the annual cattle show at Ithaca sponsored by the NTABC to attend the New York State Fair at Syracuse; and to attend and participate in the Steuben County Fair at Bath. Transportation and expenses for these programs was authorized.

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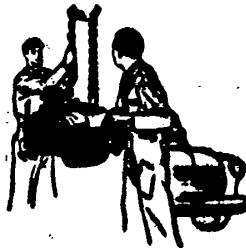
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
