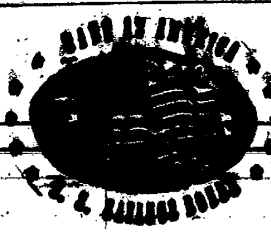

Some people make funny choices when it comes to picking their friends.

Take Old Bill, who used to jockey a hand truck down at the junction freight yard. The friend he used to talk about was neither a man or a woman—not even a cat or a dog. It was a series of staccato barks with a grunt—and—wheeze accompaniment. Any doctor would have called it a chronic cough, if any doctor had had a chance to look it over.

"It don't mean nothin'" old Bill would say between hacks and barks. "Been hangin' around for years, kind of like an old friend. Sometimes I think I'd feel lonesome if it went away."

Only one thing was wrong with this easy-going friendship. Old Bill didn't know it, but the cough he found so congenial was the kind that may be due to serious lung trouble. Chronic cough is one of the most familiar signs of RD.

RD? It means Respiratory Disease—a whole group of ailments that damage the breathing apparatus. Asthma, Chronic Bronchitis, Tuberculosis, emphysema are just a few of the Respiratory Diseases that can first announce themselves by a chronic cough.

Old Bill isn't at the freight yard anymore. Nobody knows whether he ever stopped coughing long enough to listen to some sensible advice, like, "Stroll over to Dr. Stubbins' place and have a look-see." If he did, chances are he's fine today, pushing a hand truck in some other freight depot. If he didn't—well let's just hope he did.

SPCA Spotlight

A new attraction was held on Wednesday, August 7 and Thursday, August 8 at the Allegheny County Fair.

The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals of Allegheny County sponsored the demonstration of obedience trained dogs by the Southern Tier Obedience Club. The dogs and their owners demonstrated heeling on and off the leash, jumping and retrieving on command. They showed what is needed to gain an obedience title of both CD and CDX according to regulations established by the American Kennel Club.

Taking part in the demonstration was Nicki, (a Shetland Sheep dog) owned and handled by Rita Maher, President of the Obedience Club. Nicki has his American and Canadian CD and his American CDX. Mrs. Isabel Fenner, Vice President of the Obedience Club and the SPCA handled Shalimar, a poodle, who also has her American and Canadian CD and American CDX. Both of these dogs have been top prize-winners and will be shown in Bermuda this fall.

Wendy, a German Shepherd, owned and handled by Joe Fosegan; Babbette, a poodle, owned and handled by Mary-Liz Gorton and Bridget, a Shetland Sheep dog (CD) owned and handled by Mrs. Jake Eno also took part in the demonstration. To show that a well-trained dog should respond to commands by a person other than the owner and trainer, Mrs. Fenner worked Maggie, a poodle, owned by Mrs. Helen Cottrell. Miss Shirley Wurz, President of the SPCA was the commentator explaining what the judge looks for in an obedience dog.

The SPCA hopes to gain members and raise money through this demonstration.

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LIVING UNDER LAW
AFTER THE ACCIDENT
After an automobile accident, see your doctor, even if you feel no pain. Wait until he examines you before you tell how badly injured you think you are.
If the accident injured or killed anyone, report to the police as soon as possible, and to the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles within 48 hours. You must also file with the Commissioner a report of any accident involving property damage of \$100 or more—also within 48 hours.
Notify your insurance company at once of the accident, even though it looks trivial. Delay may impair your rights under your insurance policy. Show the report to your lawyer — if you have one — before filing it.
Keep a copy of all reports you make.
Someone may try to get you to talk about the accident, or sign a release for money offered as a compensation. Consult your lawyer first.
Choose your lawyer on the basis of your own knowledge.

or that of someone whom you trust, or ask your local Bar Association or its referral bureau.
Many people carry their lawyer's name in their wallets, as they do their doctor's. You may authorize him beforehand to act for you in case you are hurt and cannot.
Above all, shun strangers—especially if they try to sign you up or urge you to take your case to some particular person you have never heard of.
Such "runners" are usually acting for someone else whose interests may be against yours.
Act promptly, but do not let anybody rush you, particularly while you are shocked or confused by the accident.
