

# Village Buys New Electric Dept. Truck

Clifford Howland, Village Elec-tric Department Superintendent, returned on August 1st from Bowl-

returned on August 1st from Bowling Green, Ohio with a new Strato Tower R.E. 35 Aerchaut mounted on a Ford F-500 chassis which had been purchased by contract bid earlier this year.

The "Strato Tower" has a working height of approximately 40 feet plus the reach of the person operating it. It can be controlled from either basket or the ground and can be rotated in a 360 degree circle as well as swang out away from the truck at a 30 degree angle. degree angle. ——
The basket and upper boom are

The basket and upper boom are made of fibre glass which makes it completely insulated for the protection of the operator as well as being equipped with the latest modern safety equipment.

The new truck is built with a utility body with bins and drawers for storage of necessary tools and supplies and has outriggers that lower out on both sides to stabilize the truck on uneven ground as well as keep it level while the boom is in operation.

According to Officials, the purchase of the new truck will not affect local taxes since this equipment is paid for by surplus revenue from the electric department.

Since the Village of Andover

since the Village of Andover owned their own distribution system, they were able to take advantage of the low rates of the Power Authority, signing a contract with them in March 1961, effective June 1961.

possible This commact made possible lower electric power rates to all local users, and at the same time the decreased costs from the Power Authority provided a b which has been used for

street lighting, other plant improvements and now for the purchase of the new truck. These rates are subject to control by the State Power Authority as set up in the original contract.
