ACS To Participate In Elementary School Travel Science Library Program

Andover is one of 700 schools chosen throughout the United States to participate in the Elementary School Traveling Science Library Program. One half of the library or eighty books have already been received. These will be replaced by eighty different books in January thus enabling the students to have the use of 160 selected science books during the year. These books are geared primarily for grade and junior high use.

The purpose of the program, sponsored by the National Science Foundation, is to develop interest in reading books (other than textbooks) in science, mathematics and about scientists; to stimulate interest in science, and to supplement the library's own resources.

Two years ago Andover Central was loaned the High School Traveling Science Library of 200 books. At the end of the year these books were given to the library. This will make 360 science books available for the student's use this year in addition to the books in our own library.

Past experience has shown that the students use these books a great deal. The school is proud to have been again chosen to receive these books.
