ACS To Participate In Elementary School Travel Science Library Program

Andover is one of 700 schools chosen throughout the United States to participate in the Elementary School Traveling Science Library Program. One half of the library or eighty books have already been received. These will be replaced by eighty different books in January thus enabling the students to have the use of 160 selected science books during the ear. These books are geared rimarily for grade and junior
