Wild Turkey Season October 21 to 26

A special three day wild turkey season for southern Delaware County and a repeat of last year's six day open season along sec-tions of the southern tier is an-nounced by the State Conserva-

The season for Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautsuqua and Steuben Counties will run October 21-26 with a one turkey per season bag limit. General regulations follow the same pattern as last year and the same pattern as last year and hunters may use only shotguns loaded with shot not larger than No. 2. Gunning hours will be from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., prevailing time of the state.

The season in Delaware County is the first controlled hunting of the one extinct game bird in east-ern New York and marks contin-ued progress in the Conservation Department's efforts to bring the wild turkey back to huntable status.

A total of 1,250 special permits

A total of 1,300 special permits are available on a first come, first served basis for the Delaware County season which will run October 7-9. Hunting will be limited to the area south of the West Branch of the Delaware River between Deposit and Stamford.
