**Keep Matches Away from Young Children**



**If your clothing catches fire, don't run . . . Roll on floor or ground . . . Smother with coat or blanket**

With the advent of crisp, cool fall weather and cold, snowy, winter weather ahead, we would be very wise indeed to heed the warnings and follow the suggestions and advice of our Volunteer Firemen who will be joining in the observance of National Fire Prevention Week from October 6th thru the 12th.

Traditionally, National Fire Prevention Week is the full calendar week including October 9th, the anniversary of the great Chicago Fire of 1871.

Why is this observance necessary? Because annually, across our nation, there are around 11,500 fire deaths, and more than one billion and a quarters worth of property that goes up in smoke.

Fire, when controlled properly, is a boon to civilization, but when handled carelessly or foolishly can be a dreaded scourge to mankind.

We, as fore-sighted intelligent people, can prevent the occurrence of many fires by making our friends, relatives and neighbors aware of potential danger spots in and around their homes, which need to be corrected.

How many people know the procedure to follow when a fire is discovered and how to report it quickly?

If fire strikes you'll need to do these two things fast: 1. GET EVERYBODY OUT OF THE HOUSE! 2. CALL THE FIRE DEPARTMENT!

In order to call the Fire Department quickly it is a good idea to have the emergency number scotch taped to your phone together with those of the Police, Ambulance, and your family Doctor. (Local Andover Residents can clip most of these numbers out of the front page of our Andover News as they appear weekly on both sides of our Mast Head.) — THEN — MAKE SURE ALL THE MEMBERS OF YOUR FAMILY KNOW THIS INFORMATION!

An active interest in Fire Prevention can save you, your family, friends and neighbors a great deal of money as well as a lot of heart aches.

A few of the most important things that should be checked at this time of year are of course your heating system and chimney.

Have your flue pipes, vent connectors, gas vents and chimneys been inspected and cleaned and repaired if necessary?

Is there any trash or combustible material near your heating system, stove pipes or chimney?

Do you extinguish all matches, cigarette and cigar butts carefully before disposing of them?

Do you destroy or safely dispose of oily polishing rags or waste after using?

Is an adult always present during the entire time trash, leaves, etc., are being burned out of doors?

Are all members of your family instructed not to smoke in bed?

Are rooms in which gas heaters are used, properly ventilated?

We are sure that if all home owners and tenants check and make the necessary corrections in the above list that many fires will be prevented.
