New Emergency System Replaces Conelrad

Following the discontinuance of Conelrad, new procedures for broadcasting Civil Defense emergency information to the public were described recently by Ray mond J. Barbuti, acting directs of the New York State UNII De fense Commission.

"The public should now disregard the 640 and 1240 frequencies rmerly reserved for civil defense

tune in local stations at their reg-ular positions on radio dials," Mr. Barbuti said.
"Under Conelard, only author-

ized stations broadcasting on 640 and 1240 were allowed to remain on the air during an emergency. The new system allows all radio stations which meet basic requires

ments to remain on the air."
"Ultimately, the network of
New York radio stations qualified to broadcast in an emergency will exceed in numbers and capa-bility the facilities afforded under Conelrad," he said.

S. S. Suspend College Qualification Test

The Selective Service College Qualification Test, used since 1951 to help local boards decide student deferment cases has been suspended. No test will be offered for the 1963-64 school year.

The suspension of the test, usually given in April, was announced by C. Backus, Chairman of Local Board 71, Belmont, New York. The decision to suspend the test was reached by Director of Selective Service, Lt. General Lewis B. Hershey, because of the small numbers of students who have applied for the test in relations. small numbers of students who have applied for the test in recent years. The score made on the test was made a part of the student's official Selective Service local heard file. local board file. The score was weighed by the local board along with other information in deciding whether to defer a student.

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
