With the army of out-of-school, mostly out-of-work youngsters. With the need for an adequate education never more evident, it is ironical that if the current rate continues, 7,500,000 pupils will drop out of high school in the present decade.

There are a number of factors involved in the school drop-out problem. Six predominate one are: (1) lack of interest in school work, (2) inability to do school work, (3) educational programs that do not meet individual needs, (4) the low economic status of parents, (5) placing of low value on schooling and (6) the lure of outside jobs and wages. Often, the last factor turns into a mirage.

The drop-out himself is, course, the greatest sufferer. All he can hope to do is the unskill-ed job. Most unskilled jobs are "drying-up" in the face of auto-mation.

No one knows a single clear-cut No one knows a single remedy for the problem. There are two schools of thought on possible educational solutions. One is for increasing vocational training facilities. The other for putting more emphasis on strengthening the basis academic curriculum.

TOFFEE NUT BARS

This recipe adds a festive touch

½ cup shortening, half butter;
½ cup brown sugar.

Stir in—½ cup flour
Press with hand to bottom of ungreased pan. Bake 10 minutes.
