Did you know that one-third of the teenagers who entered high school in the fall of 1962 will not be on hand in 1966 for graduation exercises.

There are a number of factors involved in the school drop-out problem. Six predominate one are: (1) lack of interest in school work, (2) inability to do school work, (3) educational programs that do not meet individual needs, (4) the low economic status of parents, (5) placing of low value on schooling and (6) the lure of outside jobs and wages.

The drop-out himself is, of course, the greatest sufferer. All he can hope to do is the unskilled job. Most unskilled jobs are "drying-up" in the face of automation.

No one knows a single clear-cut remedy for the problem. There are two schools of thought on possible educational solutions. One is for increasing vocational training facilities. The other for putting more emphasis on strengthening the basic academic curriculum.

Often teenagers drop out of school because of parental indifference, and in some cases, approval. Equally unimpressive arguments against dropping out of school the lists of statistics compiled by the National Education Association, showing that a high school graduate can expect to earn \$215,000 during his life compared with \$105,000 for a college graduate.

Young people who drop out of school without at least their high school education will find themselves at a considerable disadvantage in competing for jobs with their better educated competitors. So, leap up as the youth of America consider the situation seriously before making any decision to leave school that would influence our whole life. Think before you decide!

TOFFEE NUT BARS

This recipe adds a festive touch to any occasion.

Bottom Layer—Mix thoroughly—1/2 cup shortening, half butter; 1/2 cup brown sugar.

Stir in—1/2 cup flour Press with hand to bottom of ungreased pan. Bake 10 minutes. Then spread with Almond Coconut Topping.

Beat well two eggs. Stir in 1 cup brown sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla. Mix together and stir in 1 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt.

Mix in 1 cup moist shredded coconut. 1 cup cut up almonds. Return to oven and bake 25 minutes or until topping is golden brown. Makes 2 1/2 dozen bars.
