On November 5, voters will be asked to pass on a number of constitutional changes in New York State. Amendment No. 4, the Home Rule Amendment, is resoiving a good deal of publicity in the daily press a step in the direction of allowing local communities to solve their own problems at the local level. All well and good. No doubt the amendment does have some merit. However, every time you get something from a paternalistic state or federal governmnt, you give in return. In this instance, the bait held out by the Office of Local Government in Albany, by the Association of Towns, by the County Officers Association, and by the Conference of Mayors to local governments to vote in favor of this home rule amendment is that they could repeal existing requirements to publish legal notices.

To date in their efforts to promote this amendment, the advocates have carefully and successfully concealed their attempt to restrict the "peoples right to know."

The price of liberty is eternal vigilance. Consequently, we urge all voters to vote NO! to Amendment No. 4 on November 5th.
