(2) The cool weather changes the starch in the trees into sugar. The sugar, again because of the cold weather, is not used up so fast. This stored up sugar in the leaves causes the bright reds and reddish purples.

(3) If it is rainy and cloudy, the trees use the sugar to grow and their leaves turn yellow or muddy-colored.

(4) Believe it or not, trees in fertile soils do not have bright fall colors. Really brilliant colors occur on the rocky hillsides of the new England States and New York State or along the sand dunes of the Great Lakes.
