Abstract of Proposed Amendment Number One

This proposed amendment would remove exisiting restrictions upon absentee voting and authorize legislation permitting voters otherwise qualified but who may be absent from the County of their residence (New York City residents absent from the City) on the date of an election to vote at the date of an election, to vote at such election.

The proposed amendment would authorize the Legislature further authorize the Legislature to adopt special procedures permitting persons to vote for electors for the offices of president and vice- president of the United States though they have not resided within this State for one year or within a city, county or village within this State for four porths next preeding such alecyear or within a city, county or village within this State for four months next preceding such election. Such procedures would enable persons moving into this State, or from one county, city or village to another county, city or village within this State, to vote for such electors, provided they are otherwise qualified and have resided within this State for at least 90 days next preceding such election. Persons qualified and registered to vote in this State but who, within one year prior to such election, move from this State to another State, may also be permitted to vote for such electors within this State. These procedures would apply only to persons unable to qualify to vote for such electors in another State.
