The International Children's Emergency Fund is a special body, created in 1946, to help feed, clothe, and give medical care to the needy children in war devastated areas in Europe. It later extended its work to Asia, North Africa, and Latin America. It is financed by the United Nations and voluntary contributions.

Last year UNICEF aid benefited 50 million children and mothers—a number about equal to the total population of New York, California, Pennsylvania, Illinois, and Ohio. But the number of children where the need is so great is a staggering three out of four of all the world's children—more than the total population of North America, South America and Africa.

Most people never realize what wonders their small contributions can do for an underprivileged waif overseas. One penny will provide enough BCG vaccine to protect a child against TB. A nickel will provide the penicillin needed to cure a child of yaws, the crippling illness for which 27 million people have already received treatment; with UNICEF help a dime will provide about fifty glasses of milk for the children of large areas of the world where the health-giving food is considered a luxury.

So, Halloween night when the witches and goblins ring your doorbell and say, "Tricks or treat for UNICEF", give generously to this worthwhile cause.

Kitchen Korner

Cranberry Cake

- 1 well-beaten egg
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
2 tablespoons melted shortening
1 cup sifted enriched flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 pound (2 cups) cranberries
3/4 cup enriched flour
1/2 cup sugar
3 tablespoons butter or margarine

Oven 375 degrees F.
Combine egg, 1/2 cup sugar, milk and shortening. Sift flour, baking powder, and salt; add to egg mixture. Mix well. Place in greased 8x8x2-inch pan.

Put the cranberries through your food chopper, using the coarse blade; sprinkle over batter.

Mix remaining flour and sugar; cut in butter until crumbly, sprinkle over cake. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F., for 25 minutes. Serve warm or cold.

Kitchen Korner

Molasses Crinkles

- 1 cup light brown sugar
3/4 cup shortening
1/2 cup molasses
1 egg
2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon ginger
1/2 teaspoon cloves
Cream sugar, shortening molasses and egg. Spoon flour into measuring cup and pour onto square of waxed paper. Add remaining dry ingredients and stir to blend. Add dry ingredients to cream mixture and mix well. Shape into inch-balls and dip tops in granulated sugar. Place on a

greased baking sheet and bake in a 350 degree oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes about 5 dozen.
