Armistice Day was originally set up to celebrate the end of fighting in World War I, on November 11, 1918. On this great day the Allies and Germans signed a truce in a railroad dining car in the Forest of Compiègne, France.

In 1954, Armistice Day in the United States was changed to Veteran's Day. It is now a day which is set aside to honor all men and women who have served in the United States Armed Forces.

In many places throughout the world, a period of silence is observed at eleven o'clock in the morning, the hour at which the fighting stopped. British Armistice Services are held in front of the Cenotaph in London, and the French Services at the Arch of Triumph.

The celebration in the United States is centered at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. Armistice Day, 1921, marked the beginning of the American ceremony, "Bivouac of the Dead", when the body of an Unknown Soldier was brought from the battlefields of France to lie in Arlington beneath a beautiful and dignified tomb. These services have become an American tradition, observed each year.

The inscriptions on the tomb express the thoughts of all Americans. On one panel stands "Victory" with "Peace" and "Valor" by her side. On the other panel are the words "Here Rests In Honored Glory an American Soldier Known But to God."
