110-199—Philosophy (includes psychology, conduct, etc.)

200-299—Religion (includes mythology)

300-399—Social Sciences (education, economics, government, law, occupations, communications)

400-499—Language (dictionaries, the study of language and languages)

500-599—Pure Science (mathematics, chemistry, physics, astronomy, geology, biology, zoology, etc.)

600-699—Useful Arts or Applied Science (agriculture, engineering, aviation, inventions, manufacturing and commercial operations)

700-799—Fine Arts, Recreation (sculpture, painting, music, architecture, photography; includes sports)

800-899—Literature (poetry, plays, orations, essays in English and foreign languages)

900-909—930-999—History

970-979—Travel

920-929—Biography (arranged alphabetically by names of persons written about)
