The three men came down to The three men came down to Andover Sunday evening, went out Monday morning and got one buck and then went back to the same place the mext morning and nailed three more bucks, returning to Andover by 11:00 a. m with their unusual catch.

Maurice Donabella of Oswego, reased first Monday morning

scored first, Monday morning around 7:30 a. m., by getting a 4-point buck while one of the other members of the party went

other members of the party went all day without seeing a deer and the other member observing many doe but no bucks.

All three of the hunters went out bright and early Tuesday morning and Maurice, who was now wearing his party permit band, again scored first around 7:30 with a 6-point buck in the same area he had shot his previous one.

Edward Yarus, of Rochester, shot his 4-point buck around 7:35 and Joseph Chrzan of Albion, nailed his spike buck around 8:15.

Thus they were back in Andover around 11:00 a. m., with their car loaded down with three bucks which they had field dressed in the woods.

According to the hunters, all four deer were taken with each of them getting his deer with just one shot each.

Maurice has been coming down here for around the last 10 years and has been lucky enough to land a deer five different years.

Ed has been coming down to the Hotel here in Andover for the last 12 years and has the record of 7 deer over this period of time, with this year's catch making it 5 successful years in a row.

Jo has been coming down to this area for the last 4 years and has red a deer the last three yo and was lucky enough to get a wild turkey in this area around 3

years ago.

An interesting point in their hunt is the fact that Ed Rot his deer Tuesday at the same place that Maurice shot his the previous day and at the same range. When paced off, the distance proved to be a range of \$5 yards according

to the hunters. Mr. Yarus uses a 16 gauge shotgun while the other two hunters rely on 12 gauge

Another interesting from 5 mark the buck that Mr. Chrzan shot traveled a distance of 50 feet after being shot directly thru the heart. This could easily explain why dead deer are sometimes found in the woods after hunting season as they some times travel season as they some times travel quite a distance after being mortally wounded and the hunters evidentally think they missed the mark and give up the chase.

The boys report seeing at least 10 doe in the hour and ten minutes that they were afield Tuesday morning.

They said that they were rarmers themselves and didn't mean any harm but were just out for a good time. They claimed that they didn't see any posted signs but what we can't understand is how they could see a deer good enough to shoot it and still not be able to see anything as large as a posted sign, especially when they drove right by several of them. Oh well they were all reported so we imagine that they will learn to read better in the future—if and when they are allowed to buy another hunting licence in the future.

For the information of an hunters and landowners: A hunting license does not give anyone the right to hunt on private properties to the properties of the pr the right to num on private property whether posted or not. THE HUNTER MUST GET PERMISSION FROM THE PROPERTY OWNER BEFORE HUNTING ON PRIVATE PROPERTY.

If the Hunter is trespassing on private land that is not posted— HE STILL MUST LEAVE WHEN TOLD TO BY THE OWNER AND if he refuses—he is then liable

or arrest.

If the land IS POSTED—he can be arrested for trespassing and fined in accordance with the Conservation Laws.

Conservation Laws.

The Hunter ALSO MUST SHOW HIS HUNTING LICENSE AS WELL AS HIS BIG GAME TAG TO ANYONE THAT CREQUESTS TO SEE—If he refuses to do so he can be arrested on this count also and fined in addition to his other counts.

Furthermore—a property owner

to his other counts.

Furthermore—a property owner has the right to use whatever force is necessary, to eject a trespasser from his property after he has refused to leave, but no more force than is necessary.

What a farmer or property owner should, or could do when he sees a Hunter Trespassing of

he sees a Hunter Trespassing of violating the Conservation Law: is (1) Call either the Game Protector, (2) the State Police, or in the event of being unsuccessful However, the thing that shakes up the most is the mainer in the event of being unsuccessful to contact these people. (3) he could call the nearest Law Enforcement Agency IMMEDI-
