

**WHAT A FEW ROTTEN APPLES CAN DO —  
TO A BIG TIME SPORT! An Editorial**

The old expression that a few rotten apples can spoil the whole barrel, can be very suitably applied to the Big Time Sport—of Big Game Hunting.

The first week of Deer Season is only at it's half-way mark, with another week and a half yet to go. Already, several shooting accidents have been reported with hunters either hurt or killed needlessly.

However, the most alarming reports on the local scene, at least from our standpoint of view, is the poor sportsmanship and illegal actions and conduct of some of the hunters that come into this area to hunt.

We have heard many stories circulated every Deer Season about the illegal actions of some of the "City Hunters" that invade our local area, with part of these undoubtedly becoming grossly exaggerated after many tellings.

But—we witnessed first hand several episodes that occurred the first day of deer season this year that are deplorable and make it rough on all of the decent City Hunters that come down here year after year. Things which are mainly responsible for more and more landowners posting their property every year.

Several years ago we witnessed and counted 27 hunters ringed around a patch of woods belonging to the friends of ours with whom we hunt every season with goodness knows how many others were inside the woods driving.

This was the patch of woods that we had intended to drive ourselves the first thing in the morning when we witnessed this disgusting sight. During their drive we heard much shooting going on but didn't wait to see what the results of the cannonade were.

Later on, in the afternoon, after driving deer out of the neighboring woods into this patch, we put on a drive of our own and found several barb wire fences cut and a freshly killed Doe shot illegally.

Up to that time our friends hadn't bothered to post their property as they were hunters themselves and hated to deprive others of the same sport. Needless to say from that year on they have posted their property annually before deer season.

Monday, after making the first drive, which was after the farm chores had been taken care of, we observed a hunter coming out of the posted woods that we had just finished driving.

Naturally we waited to see if it was one of our friends who had arrived a little late to join us, but after he climbed the fence right next to one of the legal posted signs, we saw that it was a stranger.

When asked where he was from; "He said, Wells-ville", and claimed that he hadn't seen any posted signs where he got into the woods. Obviously he was lying, since the Posted Signs are on all four sides of the woods—besides being much closer than the law requires. Thus the number was written down as it appeared on his Big Game Hunting Tag fastened to his back, and he was told to stay off the property as well as informed that his violation was going to be reported.

Was this enough for this would be outlaw? Apparently not, for that same afternoon while we were driving the posted woods across the road, the landowner met up with this same surly youth who refused to get off the land and then resisted forceful ejection going so far as grappling with the farmer, ending up on top of him on the ground trying to choke him. Luckily, other members of our party were near enough to see what was going on and hastened to his aid.

Needless to say—this fighter, (not hunter) faces more than likely a good stiff fine and the loss of his hunting-license!

We feel that if every property owner or citizen would promptly report any violation of the State Conservation and Game Laws to the proper authorities, these few bad apples would be slowly sorted out which would make better and more pleasant hunting conditions for all good sportsmen.
