Cattle Feeder Operates Like A Weathervane

A 55-gallon drum and the front wheel and axle assembly from an automobile can be converted easily to a "weathervane" mineral feed-er for cattle, according to Cornell

University agricultural engineers.

Plans for this small swivel feeder, which turns with the wind to protect its contents from rain, snow, or dust, are offered by the N.Y. State College of Agriculture in Cornell

The device is made by cutting away a side portion of the drum to give the cow access to the min-The drum is then mounted on the wheel assembly, and a sim-ple weathervane is attached to the top.

The designers recommended coating the inside of the drum with asphalt, as well as painting other metal parts. The completed feeder should be set on a level surface.

The design for this feeder (Plan No. 5844) is available from county agricultural agents or by writing the Agricultural Engin-eering Dept., Riley-Robb Hall, Cornell University, Ithaca, N. Y.

The Department of Agriculture The Department of Agriculture and Markets is calling upon the thousands of public eating places in New York State to obey a new law which requires signs, labels or menu statements when dairy products and products that look like dairy products are served to customers. The Department's inspectors have found widespread disrepard for the law.

When melloream and vegetable oil blends are served, no matter what brand name, and whenever cream, half and half, milk or a mixture of milk and cream is served in any public eating place, the name of the product must be

of the blended products are so nearly like their dairy competit-ors that it is often difficult for the patron to distinguish between them, the Department says. The blends contain vegetable fats or oils and proteins derived from animal or vegetable sources.

The purpose of the law which the Department is charged with

enforcing is "to promote honesty and fair dealing in the interest of consumers, to insure fair competition with a highly regulated dairy industry which is of considerable economic importance to the economy of the State and to prevent confusion and deception in the sale of such foods."

When the products that look like dairy products are sold in containers, specific label require-ments are set up to guide purchasers.
