Since most teenagers begin to drive at sixteen or seventeen there are some specific rules which should be obeyed in order to have a safe highway. Some of these rules include:

- Always be on the alert; think ahead.
- Obeey traffic signs, speed limits, and road markings.
- Avoid "tailgating", that is following too close behind another car.
- Make a habit of putting on signal lights 100 feet before making the turn.
- Make sure the car is in good condition.
- Don't pass until it is safe.
- Be sure to have your license and registration with you.
- When driving during dark hours make sure your lights are on.
- For every ten miles, per hour you should stay the distance of one car-length behind a car. e.g. If the car is going fifty miles an hour, the car behind should stay five-car-lengths behind.
- Always have a dependable flashlight and map in the car.
