Editorial

Twenty-six years ago on January 3, President Franklin D. Roosevelt stated the aims of the newly formed National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis as "to lead, direct and unify" the fight against polio.

After the war, work proceeded slowly until 1961. In September, 1951, it was determined that polio was caused by three different kinds of viruses.

In March, 1963, the first report of an anti-polio "killed virus" vaccine was given. This was developed by Mr. Jonas Salk under the March of Dimes grant.

In July, 1963, the National Foundation expanded its goals to include arthritis, and birth defects as initial new targets, in addition to polio.

Between the years 1950 to 1954 the average number of polio victims was 38,727 per year. The estimated number of victims in 1963 was 500.

So, certainly this past decade has been an eventful one for the National Foundation. Yet, this great work could not have been accomplished without the generosity of the American people.

Let us now continue giving and possibly ten years from now, through research and science, we will be able to control as well as the dreaded polio is today.
