by Vicki Lynch Twenty-six years ago on Jan-mary 3, President Franklin D. Roosevelt stated the aims of the newly formed National Founda-

Roosevelt stated the aims of the newly formed National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis as "to lead, direct and unify" the fight against polio. Work just nicely got underway when it was interrupted by World War II.

After the war, work proceeded, 1951, it was determined that polio was caused by three different kinds, of viruses. Human field trials on effectiveness of gamma globulin in preventing polio paralysis were conducted in the sumper of 1952.

In March, 1963, the first report of an anti-polio "killed visus" vaccine was given. This was developed by Mr. Jonas Salk under the March of Dimes grant. In April, 1954, March of Dimes field trials for Salk vaccine began with 1, 330,000 school children participating. Among this vast number was our present day sophomore lass of Andover Central. A year

830,000 school children participating. Among this vast number was our present day sophomore class of Andover Central. A year later the Salk vaccine was promounced safe, potent and effective. In July 1968, the National Foundation expanded its goals to include arthritis, and birth defects as initial new targets, in addition to polio. In July, 1959, further field trials of the Sabin oral vaccine were recommended.

estimated number of victims in
1953 was 500. Even though the
number of polio cases is greatly
reducted, the March of Dimes
Foundation is still used to fight
polio. There are still more than
120,000 persons in the United
States who are partially or completely paralyzed as a result of
polio. These victims still need
