#### MOTHER'S BIG HELPER

As more and more women have chosen to face childbirth without the aid of anesthetizing drugs, there has been a corresponding in-

crease in the number of mothers who want their husbands with them "to share their happiness at this important moment of their lives together."

So says, Dr. Robert A. Bradley, a Denver obstetrician and consultant to the International Childbirth Education Association, Inc. He agrees with the starry-eyed mothers that their husbands can provide closes spiritual rapport if taken of the floor-walking circuit and placed directly at the scene of blessed evenfulness.

Writing recently in Medical Tribune, Dr. Bradley declared that "probably nothing is as reassuring to the inexperienced, anxious woman than the knowledge that her husband is invited to be with her throughout "the occasion." Rather than being "in the way,"

the husband can make himself useful around the place, running errands, holding cold cloths to the maternal brow, administering back rubs, fetching ice:

There were those who thought it would never work, who predicted various troubles. Experience has proved them wrong, Dr. Bradley says. Husbands don't "get in the way," but sit where they are told to. They don't get sick or faint. Nor do they "contaminate" the premises: they wear white scrub suit, cap and mask like hospital or TB veterans.


Perhaps most useful of all, many a husband has brought a feeling of relaxation and security to his wife's ordeal. "Jovial" remarks pass between couples, Dr. Bradley notes, that "create an atmosphere of wholesome joy."

So successful had the method turned out, Dr. Bradley says, that many husbands: "fell their presence to be just as necessary at the termination of pregnancy as it was at the origin."


