Attacking the proposed King-Anderson bill as too coatly as well as unwarranted, Dr. Wheeler warned that if this legislation were enacted, it would mean

calculations—an increase of
\$341,200,000 in Social Security
taxes in 1965, causing the total Social Security tax bill to the people of New York State to rise that year to \$8,238,900,000. In addition, there would be an in-crease of \$33,300,000 in general taxes, Br. Wheeler contended.

"Insurance actuaries, however, believe that the King-Anderson bill would cost at least twice the Administration's esti-mate", Dr. Wheeler declared, adding: "In all likelihood, therefore. New York's share of the tax load would be even more staggering."

In concluding his testimony, Dr. Wheeler requested that the committee use every-means at its command to encourage the further development of the remarkable progress made by the voluntary insurance plans, through such measures as income tax
