It happened again. The brakes gave out on a large tractor-trailer loaded with steel coils. The truck, operated by Lester Smith, Jr., of Hamburg, was coming down the Andover Hill and was unable to stop for the intersection in Greenwood Thursday afternoon. It hit the stone wall in front of Rogers and Son Lumber Store. It then struck the rear of a parked car owned by Donald Nearpass, damaging it extensively and pushed that car into one owned by Ned Teribury. The load on the truck shifted and broke loose and landed on the sidewalk. Three coils of steel, each weighing 2600 pounds, crashed through the front of Orville Matthews building supply store destroying the front. Mr. Matthews was in the store when the cinder blocks, tile, glass and glass bricks came flying toward him. The wall in front of Rogers Store cut down his damage. The debris broke a window, cracked blocks and weakened supports so that the North half of the front of the store will need to be rebuilt. Mr. Rogers was out front and saw the truck coming and realized it was about to hit. No one was injured in the accident. Nearpass was sitting in his car and he and Smith were both all right. No estimate of damage was given.

Steuken County Sheriff's Deputy Gerald Dartt of Cameron and Deputy Stanley Murray of Greenwood investigated the accident and helped with traffic. The driver was taken before Justice of Peace Douglas Cornell. He was fined \$10 for failure to stop for flashing red light. William O'Hargan towed the two cars down to his garage. Alex Brown, Town Road Superintendent, brought town machinery and hoisted the steel coils back on the truck.
