Wellsville-Allentown Section Of Route 17 To Be Resurfaced

News has been released from the office of J. Burch McMorran, superintendent of the State De-partment of Public Works, that the stretch of Route 17 between Wellsville and Allentown is in-cluded in the list of 27 State Highcluded in the list of 2.1 State figures way improvement projects for 1964. Bids for the projects, which will cost an estimated record, breaking total of \$81,028,000, will be opened on March 5, 1993, D09, will-be opened on March 5, 1993. The Route 17 improvement locally will start from the intersection of Route 19, and extend southwesterly 7.26 miles to just west of the Alma-Bolivar Town Line. The 24-foot and varible width highway will be resurfaced with asphalt congrete over met of the section. with the resultated with asphalt concrete over most of the section. In the hamlet fo Allentown, the highway will be rebuilt with a new 40-foot-wide asphalt pavement. Estimated cost of this Allegany County project is \$760,000.
