Out of the Darkness

Thomas Alva Edison was born February 11, 1847 in Milan, Ohio. Every young boy adored the "Wizard of Menlo Park" who had only three months of formal schooling and at twelve worked as a newsboy and a "candy butcher". His philosophy is remembered the world over, "Genius is one per cent inspiration and ninety-nine per cent perspiration."

At 22 he landed in New York, penniless. Once Thomas A. Edison reached New York, the road to invention was open. Within a year, he had invented a stock ticker and had \$40,000.

Edison was truly the father of modern invention. He called himself an inventor, not a scientist. Yet, he made two great scientific discoveries—these being "etheric force", the basis of wireless telegraphy and radio; and the "Edison effect" by which electronics were discovered and harnessed. Perhaps the greatest of Edison's contributions to science was organized research. He hired teams of men; he was not a "lone tinkerer."

Again and again Edison exhibited his great perseverance. When searching for a domestic source of rubber, he tested 17,000 different plants; and after 8,000 unsuccessful trials on a nickel-iron storage battery, he remarked cheerfully, "well, at least, we know 8,000 things that won't work."

Edison died in 1931 at the age of eighty-four. The world had been changed greatly by the perseverance and intelligence of Thomas A. Edison. "Many in the world may not have noted well all that Thomas A. Edison did in his research laboratory, but his light will shine forever."
