DISAPPEARING ACT

People keep asking, "Why all the talk about tuberculosis when everybody knows it's disappearing fast?"

The answer is that there's a certain crucial difference between real disappearance and a "disappearing act." The alleged disappearance of TB is more apparent than real.

Tuberculosis staged a dramatic upsurge in the first six months of 1963 in New York City, for example, with the health commissioner reporting a sharp rise in the case rate—the first increase in 10 years. Chicago, despite a moderate decrease, reported a continuing TB situation that made necessary an all-out struggle on the part of health forces.

True, there has been some basis for the general notion that TB is "on the way out." Since the introduction of highly effective "wonder drugs" in tuberculosis treatment, beginning with streptomycin in the mid-forties, there has been a gratifying decline in the rate of new cases and deaths. Only in recent years have these throughout the United States. "wonder drugs" given rise to "wonder germs" strains of tubercle bacilli that have learned to adapt themselves to the action of the drugs and to withstand their effects.

Determined research is now going on in various quarters to develop further improved drugs that will overcome the NEW resistance. This is a slow, gradual business. Meanwhile the vigorous case detection and prevention campaigns carried on against TB by your Christmas Seal organization continue the year round.

And that, by the way, is one more reason why you should respond now to your Christmas Seal appeal if you didn't get around to it during the season. It still isn't too late. And it's still important.

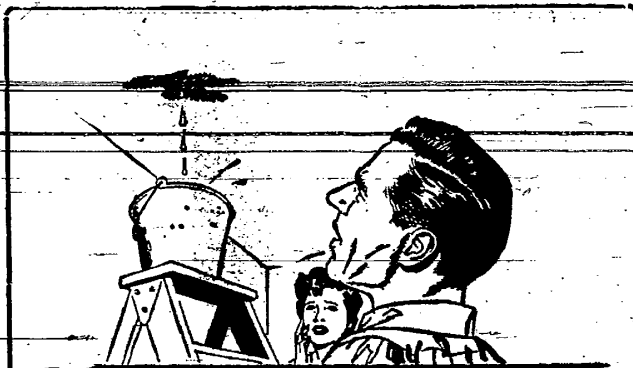
Mrs. Earl E. Whiting

Chauffeurs License

Leagine February 29th

New York State chauffeurs are urged to check the expiration date on their licenses since some 150,000 of them will no longer be valid after midnight this Saturday.

All 150,000 drivers should have received their punch card renewal applications long before this and the majority already have taken advantage of the opportunity to renew by mail. Those who have not renewed as yet, Motor Vehicle Commissioner William S. Hults says, had better do so by visiting the nearest motor vehicle office before Saturday for it will not be open that day, February 29th.

The application must be validated for otherwise it is not a license to drive. It must be stamped and the fee paid before it may be used.

This is the first renewal period punch card licenses ever issued by for the first staggered-expiration, the Department of Motor Vehicles. The new system was adopted in 1961 and now covers all driver licenses in the state.
