Johann Gutenberg was born in 1400 in Manz (Germany, His fam-ily later moved to Strasbourg. ily later moved to Strasbourg.

In 1438, Gutenberg entered into a partnership with three others to conduct experiments in printing. In Manz. about 1450, Gutenberg joined into a partnership with a goldsmith, Johann Fust and set up a press on which he started printing a large Latin Bible and some smaller books and leaflets. Fust's demands for the repayment of money he had in vested led to a law suit in 1455, and Gutenberg surrendered his

share of the firm.

The famous "Gutenberg Bible" was finished before the middle of 1456, but was actually printed by Peter Schoffer, who was Fust's partner. This book is the first volume known to have been printed with movable metal type. The first copy, that attracted attention was discovered about 1760 among the books of Cardinal Jules Mazarin. The finest known copy was acquired by the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C., in 1930. Only two other perfect copies of the "Gutenberg Bible" are known to be in existence. to be in existence.

Lent

We are now passing through a period of forty days known as Lent. Many of us give up something during Lent, but now many of us know how it originated?

Lent begins each year on Ash
Wednesday and ends Laster Sunday. The length of the fast and
the rigor with which it has been
observed have varied greatly in
different countries. In the time
of Ireameus, the fast before Easter was very short, but very severe; thus some ate nothing for
40 hours between the ofternoon of
Good Friday and the morning of
Easter Sunday. In Alexandria, Easter Sunday. In Alexandria, tury it was already customary to fast during Holy Week; and ear-lier still the Montanists boasted that they observed a two weeks' fast instead of one. Lent has been regarded since the fourth century

regarded since the fourth century as forty days.

During the religious confusion of the Reformation, the practice of fasting was generally relaxed and it was found necessary to reassert the obligation by keeping Lent and the other periods and days of abstinence by a series of proclamations and estatute. mays or abstinence by a series of proclamations and statutes. During the eighteenth century, the strict observance of the Lenten fast was generally abandoned although it was still observed and incoulted by inculcated by the mose earn of the clergy and the custom women wearing movering in Lent, survived until well into the ninesurvived until well into the nine-teenth century. With the growth of the Oxford Movement in the English Church, the practice of observing Lent was revived; and though no rules for fasting are authoritatively laid down; the duty of abstinence is now very generally included by hisbors very generally inculcated by bishops and clergy, either as a discipline or as an exercise of sejf-denial.
