Although little is known of his Although little is known of his early life, it is believed that Patrick was the son of a Christian deacon. Patrick led a dramatic life, full of adventure. When he was sixteen, a band of marauders carried him off to Ireland where he tended the flocks of a chieftan in Ulster. Six years of slavery made him-a devoted Christian.

the Gospel. In 432 A.D. he returned as a missionary bishop. His ardor and intense faith made St. Patrick a persuasive preacher. His courage empressed even the Irish high king Loigaire who took St. Patrick under his protection. His labors were so successful that he came to be known as one who "fugund Ireland all heathen and Ieft it all Christian". Over three hundred churches were founded by St. Patrick and more than 120,000 people were baptized.

The legend of St. Patrick driving the snakes out of Ireland is probably the best known story about him. It is said that he charmed the snakes of freland down to the seashore so they were driven into the water and drowned. To this day there are no said to have used the three-leaved.
