St. Patrick, the Irish patron saint, ironically was born either in England or Scotland. He was born in Bannauem which may have been in England near the Seven estuary, or in Scotland, near the modern city of Dumbarton.

Although little is known of his early life, it is believed that Patrick was the son of a Christian deacon. Patrick led a dramatic life, full of adventure. When he was sixteen, a band of marauders carried him off to Ireland where he tended the flocks of a chieftan in Ulster. Six years of slavery made him a devoted Christian.

After escaping to France, he became a monk. Patrick spent at least a dozen years in the monastery of St. Martin at Auxerre. While there "The voice of the Irish" came to him, beseeching him to return to Ireland to spread the Gospel.

In 432 A.D. he returned as a missionary bishop. His ardent and intense faith made St. Patrick a persuasive preacher. His courage impressed even the Irish high king Loigaire who took St. Patrick under his protection. His labors were so successful that he came to be known as one who "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian". Over three hundred churches were founded by St. Patrick and more than 120,000 people were baptized.

The legend of St. Patrick driving the snakes out of Ireland is probably the best known story about him. It is said that he charmed the snakes of Ireland down to the seashore so they were driven into the water and drowned. To this day there are no snakes native to Ireland. He is said to have used the three-leaved shamrock as a symbol with which to explain the miracle of the Trinity.

Whenever Irish are, March 17 is the universal time for the "wearing of the green". The Irish blarney and luck is doubly thick for the Irishman on St. Pat's Day.

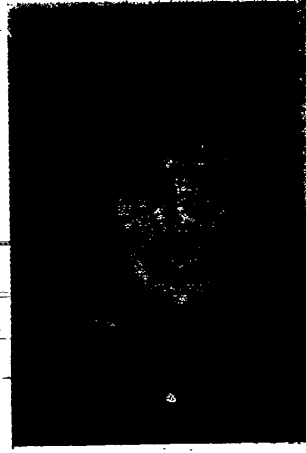
HALL OF FAME

Five first place medals, two second place medals, and five third place medals were awarded to Andovers small eight man team. Last Saturday evening at Wayland, N. Y., the Southern Tier Swimming League staged their first annual championship meet. Andover was rated as the weakest team, carrying only eight qualified swimmers, as compared to the other schools each hosting about 20 men.

There are 12 different contests in a swimming meet and because of a lack of men, Andover could swim in only 7 of these contests. Considering these handicaps it is with great joy that we announce that our boys won 12 medals. Of the four schools participating, only Wayland won more gold medals than Andover.

Our boys placed in the following respect: The 200 yard medley relay took first place. This is the first relay team to beat Wayland in three years. The relay included Dave Peckham, Jeff Common, Bob McGillivray and Bill Grossman.

The next event was the 200 yard freestyle. Clair Updyke placed 3rd in this event. To understand what an accomplishment this was, it should be explained that Clair barely managed to qualify for 5th place two nights earlier at Canistota. Therefore, he really had to put forth a tremendous effort to take that 3rd place and bronze medal.

Bill Grossman broke his own time in the 100 yard freestyle, but was only able to place 2nd in the stiff competition. Had he not broken his own record, he would not have won that silver medal.

Bob McGillivray did an outstanding job in the 200 yd. individual medley. He won 2nd place and another silver medal for us.

The next event that Andover entered was the 400 yard freestyle. Jeff Common did a wonderful job in this event by setting a new Wayland pool record and finishing several laps ahead of even the 2nd place man. This was to be Andover's final gold medal of the evening.

Probably one of the happiest occurrences happened in the last event of the evening. At this point Andover had exhausted its supply of older experienced swimmers and had only our new and younger boys left. The 200 yard freestyle relay would naturally go to Wayland, but 2nd and 3rd places were in hot pursuit by the three remaining schools, Andover, Canistota and Naples. It was by sheer determination and drive that Andover's relay team took 3rd place away from Naples. So it was that Larry Cook, Ralph Weber, Gary Ordway and Dave Peckham finished our evening at Wayland by bringing our total of medals to twelve.

Next Saturday Jeff Common, Bob McGillivray and Bill Grossman will travel to Genesee State Teachers College to compete in the 1964 Section V Championship Meet.

This week the volleyball team, nine-time champions and badminton champions will be chosen to compete in the Section V Winter Carnival in Wellsville.
