March Is Red Cross Month

"March is Red Cross Month", Allegany County Chapter Chair-man, Mrs. Leon Coffin of Andover reminded today. "The emphasis is on service during this transition period between winter's fire dis-asters and spring's flood disas-ters."

Fred Palmer of Alfrde Station, disaster service chairman, stressed the unusually large number of fires which were investigated and assisted by Red Cross in the county during the three months from December 1 to March 1. A total of 13 fires were handled by the chapter. chapter.

While local flooding was averted during recent storms, a 5-state area including Pennsylvania, during recent storms, a 5-state area including Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky is now receiving assistance from Red Cross. 50 experienced disaster workers and many Red Cross nurses have moved into the 62 county area to assist local Red Cross personnel.

In recognition of such relief actions throughout the world, the 1963 Nobel Peace Prize was awarded jointly to the League of Red Cross Societies and to the International Committee of the Red Cross. President of American Red Cross Alfred M. Gruenther termed it "a tribute to the millions of volunteers around the termed it "a tribute to the interior into the world who through their work with their Red Gress societies exemplify the best side of man—his concern for his suffering fellows."

Cancer Crusade To Start April 5th

It has been announced by George B. Clark, Jr., President of Allegany Co. Unit of the American Cancer Society that the Annual American Cancer Society Crusade to save more lives thru research, education and service will be launched in the County

He also announced that he has appointed Fred Gauld of Wellsville and George Hackett of Friendship to lead the 1964 Crusado

In accepting the top crusade post in this county, the chairmen are calling on everyone "to do his part in the fight against cancer.
They noted that the disease will eventually strike some 48,000,000 Americans now living, according to present rates. "All of us", they to present rates. "All of us", they said, 'either directly or indirectly are destined to be touched by the suffering caused by cancer. Therefore all of us must unite against the disease."

"All of us admit cancer is an urgent problem". Mr. Clark expressions of the clark expressions of the control of the c

urgent problem", Mr. Clark explained. "About 530,000 will develop cancer in 1964. There will be more than 280,000 deaths from this disease this year. In the face of this, we must wasta no time in developing new cures for cancer and better detection techniques because lost time means lost lives. The Society's broad research program is geared to move ahead toward this end. Also the Society must move ahead with its educa tion and service programs—both of which are saving lives now."

More". To Cure More, Give More", said Mr. Clark, "reflect the Society's determination to reach more people with life-saving facts about cancer; provide more physdetection and treatment; to sup port more scientists in the growing cancer research field, and to sup-ply more service to cancer pa-tierts.
