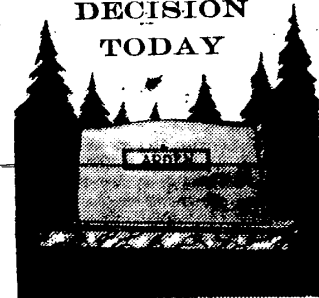
A small amount of money from various sources is already at hand to get the fund started.
