N. Y. S. Grange Opposes Change In Liquor Laws

"Unaltered and continuing opposition to any change in the liquor laws of New York State which would tend to make liquor more available or to increase its consumption," was expressed at

Ithaca by unanimous action of the executive committee of the New York State Grange.

In its regular monthly session, the executive body of the 90,000 member farm family fraternity hit at the "extra expense" of the special session of the New York legislature, and particularly decried the "unwarranted pressures being applied on our elected representatives who have already clearly expressed the position of the majority of the people by their previous opposition to any change in the alcoholic beverage control laws."

Proclamation

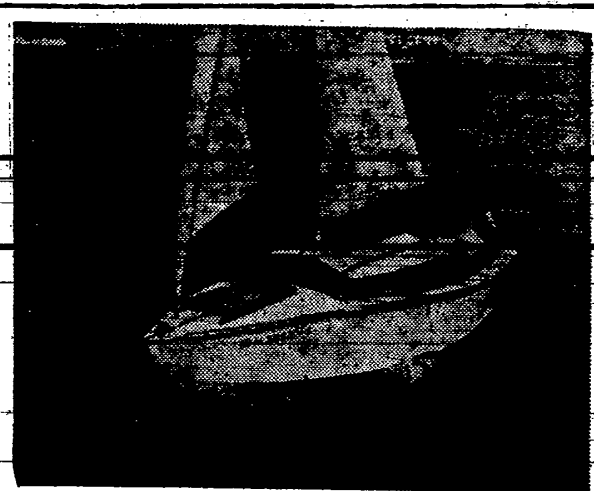
BY THE GOVERNOR

Governor Rockefeller this week proclaimed April as "Cancer Education Month" and urged that such education be projected to "every family in the State".

"The attack on cancer is going forward on several fronts," the Governor said, "including research, case-finding and education. We still must learn more about cancer—what causes it, how it develops and spreads and how it can be prevented. We must also make further use of the knowledge we now possess."

"Every family in the State must be reached through cancer education, enabling each individual to realize that early detection and treatment may lead to victory over cancer. With continued public enlightenment, the danger signals of cancer are more readily recognized. What is equally important is the individual's realization that he must immediately seek medical advice when these danger signals occur."
