born in Wellsville, N. Y., January
12, 1893, the son of Michael and
Agnes Murphy Snea. He received
his early education at District
School, the Immaculate Conception School and Welleville High
School from which he graduated
in 1916. He spent the next four
years of study at St. Michael's
College at Toronto University in
Canada and graduated in 1920.
His higher education was furthered by studying abroad at Urban
College Propaganda. in Rome. On
April 19, 1924 he was ordained
to the Holy Priesthood at St. John
Lateran in Rome.

He also served in this capacity at St. Mark's and Holy Cross in Buffalo. Later he was named pastor of St. Paul of the Cross in Dayton, N. Y., from there to Sacred Heart in Lukewood, to Holy Trinity in Dunkirk and at St. Michael's In Warraw.
